Emotional Expressions by Gender



The emotional expressions listed below by gender are broad generalisations, as individuals' reactions may vary.

MEN WOMEN

HAPPINESS MEN: Relaxed jaw, shoulders slightly back, small hand gestures, restrained movements. Deeper tone of voice, moderate pitch variation, controlled laughter. Subtle smile with minimal teeth showing, cheeks slightly raised, eyebrows relaxed, tongue rarely visible, brief eye contact. Short affirmations, jokes, and understated compliments. Physically calm, mentally composed, focused on control.

HAPPINESS WOMEN: Relaxed jaw, shoulders open, animated hand gestures, frequent touching. Higher pitch voice, wide pitch variation, and frequent laughter. Broad smile with teeth visible, cheeks lifted high, eyebrows arched, tongue occasionally visible in laughter, prolonged eye contact. Enthusiastic words, detailed sharing, affectionate terms. Physically energetic, mentally open, socially engaging.

ANGER MEN: Tight jaw, squared shoulders, clenched fists, expansive stance. Loud volume, sharp tone, forceful delivery. Furrowed brows, narrowed eyes, clenched jaw with teeth showing, cheeks tense, tongue pressed against teeth. Direct, confrontational words, commands. Physically aggressive, mentally assertive, dominance-focused.

ANGER WOMEN: Tense jaw, hunched shoulders, restrained hand movements. Higher pitch voice, faster speech, less volume. Raised brows, tense lips, jaw tight but teeth less exposed, cheeks flushed, tongue rarely visible. Indirect criticism, emotional emphasis, defensive words. Physically restrained, mentally frustrated, socially cautious.

SADNESS MEN: Slack jaw, slouched shoulders, minimal hand movement. Lower tone of voice, slower pace, flat delivery. Downturned mouth, cheeks sagging, eyebrows drawn together, minimal tears, tongue hidden, teeth not visible, gaze averted. Few words, short responses, silence. Physically withdrawn, mentally suppressed, inward focus.

SADNESS WOMEN: Trembling jaw, collapsed shoulders, hands covering face or reaching for comfort. Soft tone of voice, wavering pitch, expressive crying. Tearful eyes, trembling lips, cheeks wet with tears, eyebrows raised in distress, tongue occasionally visible when sobbing, teeth clenched or hidden. Expressive words, emotional sharing, self-reflection. Physically vulnerable, mentally open, seeking support.

FEAR MEN: Tight jaw, rigid shoulders, defensive hand positioning. Short, clipped speech, lower pitch. Narrowed eyes, clenched jaw, cheeks tense, eyebrows furrowed, tongue pressed against teeth, teeth clenched. Minimal words, cautious phrases. Physically tense, mentally alert, self-protective.

FEAR WOMEN: Trembling jaw, hunched shoulders, protective hand gestures (covering chest/face). A higher-pitched voice, faster speech and vocalised fear sounds. Wide eyes, raised brows, open mouth with teeth visible, tongue visible in gasps, cheeks lifted in tension. Exclamations, pleas for help, descriptive fear words. Physically shaky, mentally anxious, outwardly expressive.

SURPRISE MEN: Relaxed jaw drop, quick shoulder movement, restrained hand gestures. Short exclamations, lower-pitched voice. Raised brows, widened eyes, jaw dropped slightly with teeth visible, cheeks lifted, tongue rarely visible, brief reaction. Brief words ("oh", "wow"), understated. Physically reactive, mentally processing quickly.

SURPRISE WOMEN: Open jaw, lifted shoulders, hands covering mouth or chest. Longer exclamations, higher pitch, varied tone. Prolonged widened eyes, raised brows, open mouth with teeth and tongue visible, cheeks lifted high, animated expression. Elaborate words, expressive phrases. Physically animated, mentally curious, socially expressive.

Challenging gender expectations may cause men to be seen as weak and lose authority, while women may be labelled as aggressive, leading to criticism or exclusion. Trans people are often judged more harshly if their emotional expression does not align with their gender identity.
